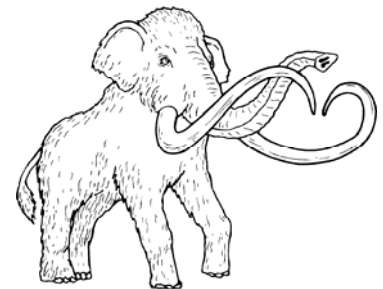
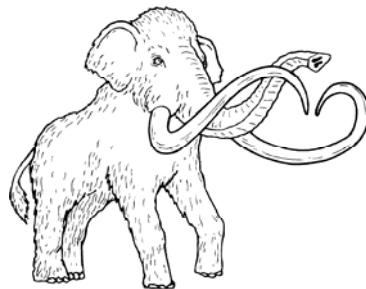

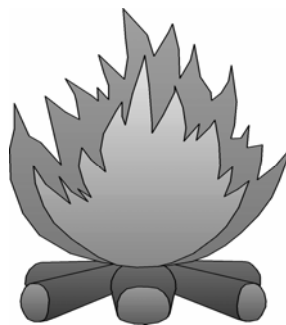

- ✓ **Carry water AND drink it**
